Executive Headteacher's Message

Dear students; parents / carers and staff,

Welcome to our Autumn Term newsletter.

It has been a long and incredibly busy term as you will have seen from the regular communication and letters shared by the school. As we approach the end of term and our thoughts turn to preparing for the festive season, it is a fitting time to reflect on the many successes and achievements we have celebrated since the start of the academic year as a



school community and remind ourselves as to what makes Bourne Academy such a wonderful school. Our students continue to make us proud every day and in every way in the continued hard work and dedication they illustrate in their lessons and online where necessary, as we continue to move through this time where the COVID-19 pandemic has impacted on all our lives.

Despite the current challenging times we have found ourselves in, I am sure you will agree that the variety of activities and events Bourne Academy has still been involved in that are shared in this newsletter are truly impressive. There have been many individual and group student achievements and this edition is again packed full of events and activities to celebrate.

One of the main questions I am currently asked by the Key Stage 4 and Post 16 students is "what will happen to the summer exams" and on Thursday 03 December we woke to the news of the DFE and Government initial plans for summer examinations 2021. In response I have already written to all Key Stage 4 and Post 16 parents / carers and students and we have also spoken to all our Year 11 and 13 students to share what is known about the changes and how we can and will support our learners to keep them at the front of the race for success this year.

By now you all may have seen the government's announcement about the package of measures to address the loss of learning and teaching this year, and the contingency plans for the future summer 2021 exams, but if not the details can be accessed via the following link:

In brief these new measures for A Level and GCSE include:

- More generous grading than usual, in line with 2020;
- Students receiving advance notice of some topic areas covered in GCSE and A-levels, to help them focus their revision;
- Exam aids like formula sheets provided in some exams to give students more confidence and reduce the amount of information they need to memorise;
- Contingency exams held shortly after the main exam series so students can sit a paper if they miss all their assessments in a subject because of illness or self-isolation.

The new measures complement the existing changes for next summer which include:

- reduced content in many subjects;
- a delay to the start of exams and changes to the timetable.

For the BTEC subjects, all we know at this moment is that there will also be adaptations to vocational and technical qualifications to make sure there's parity with general qualifications.

Additionally, you might like to know that the DFE has also announced that test and exam results won't be included in performance tables this year, with the performance tables being replaced by attendance information, student destinations and the subjects taken at Key Stage 4 and Post 16.

For our Year 11 and Post 16 learners, their PPE (mock) examinations will continue, starting with the Year 11 in January and these exams will be set and graded in line with what we know of the new national expectations, i.e. with some level of

prompts and whole school standardised marking to support these learners and it is still going to be important for students to prepare for these exams in advance, which we have urged them to do.

As well as a continued focus on learning during this term at Bourne Academy, we feel that it has been important to also support all the charitable events. We see this is one of the things that makes Bourne Academy special. Our charity successes can be seen in this newsletter and include:

The Poppy Appeal:

Although we couldn't support Remembrance in our usual high-profile way, we were able to show our support by setting up our Just Giving page, which successfully raised over £500.

Children in Need:

As it was not possible to have a non-uniform day due to the COVID health and safety arrangements in school because we need to be able to see each student's tie and the Year Group identity, many of us supported this event by wearing Pudsey Bear ears and wacky socks or tights!

Just Giving Tree:

This new appeal for our school has been hugely successful, with many people opting to bring in gifts; toys or make donations for local children working with the Salvation Army at this time when local need is greater than normal.

The Food Bank Appeal:

The support shown for this appeal has been overwhelming, with many parents / carers; staff and students bringing in items that will go to support local families over the Christmas period.

Save The Children:

Drop Everything and Read!

Year 7 have now experienced two DEAR events! These involve starting a lesson with a special session of reading with their teacher, designed to widen the students horizons and allow them some time to explore new ideas about the curriculum. DEAR 1 took place on Wednesday 14 October and was very successful. It has just been followed by DEAR 2 on the 25 November which was equally inspiring.



Students read about killer Komodo dragons in Science, learning lots of detailed facts about them, including how they manage to hunt for animals much bigger than they are, such as the water buffalo. The fascinating story of Katherine Johnson was featured in Maths, while in ICT students read about The NHS and Health Apps.









In **Geography** students read about Antelope Canyon in Arizona and Lizzie said, 'I was immediately excited'. Matilda felt 'this reading helped me find a love for this magnificent place'. Mia appreciated that the teacher helped her to learn new vocabulary and Fearne was inspired to learn about tourism. Faith said, 'I was imagining the place to be bright and colourful and my expectations were met as we looked at the photos'.

Amelia wrote a short report on the **History** DEAR topic 'A Brief History of Changing Hairstyles in History': 'I really liked the article we read as it was fun and we got to learn about how old hair was styled. I also loved how we highlighted key words as it gave us more of an understanding of what we were reading. This engaged me into the history of it. The article made me want to learn more about haircuts and now I have lots of questions I want to find the answers to.'





Art DEAR reading focussed on the artist Banksy with Harry learning that Banksy produced pieces of work that pop up randomly in public places and CJ finding out that Banksy has made a lot of money! The activity provoked a lot of interest in the word 'controversial', which Banksy certainly is!

The **Performing Arts** subjects took part in DEAR 2 and made some impact with their articles about drama and music. In **Drama** the students read about Daniel Day Lewis and his 'Method Acting' approach to performing, Jamie finding out that he has won 3 Academy Awards and that he 'becomes' the character when he acts. Lily said 'he is an amazing actor as he doesn't play the character, he is the character'. In **Music** students found out that music is good for helping them to remember things and that there can be benefits to studying with music – more controversy perhaps!








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National Poetry Day

We tell ourselves it's horrible; is it really?


A shadow, the darkness, taking those we love dearly.

The students have been involved in a variety of activities this term in their SMSC (Spritual, Moral, Social and Cultural) form time sessions. 
PSHE

Computer Science

All staff in the Computer Science Department and students have been working very hard this term!

Key Stage 3

Next term we will be looking at Programming with Python in Year 7 and Year 8 and learning about Cybersecurity in Year 9.


Key Stage 4


For BTEC Year 10 students, we have started the coursework element of the course with the intention to complete all coursework units by the end of Year 10! We have been learning about the different types of user interfaces and their design. We have considered accessibility needs when designing and using an interface. We have learnt about project planning techniques such as Gantt charts and Pert charts. We also learnt how to design mood boards and consider security aspects and constraints whilst working on a project. And finally we have designed a user interface to a brief considering all aspects of user requirements including accessibility features. The deadline for the second part of the coursework is fast approaching and everyone has been very keen to complete to the last minute! All work looks to be a really good standard! Our next stage is to make the user interface for the brief.


For BTEC Year 11 students, we have been concentrating on the last element of their learning journey, C3 exam unit. Students have now learnt all 3 topics related to content; Modern Technologies, Cyber Security, Implications of Digital Systems, and have started the flow diagrams/flowcharts topic. We have continued to run revision lunch time and after school sessions on Tuesday and Thursday where students have been using revision booklets to further extend their knowledge for a successful sitting of the exam in February.


We have shared our subject information for the Virtual Open evening with students and we are hoping that many will be applying to study BTEC ICT and Computing at Year 12!

Students have been working very hard and have completed some very professional adverts! Next on our learning journey is to start preparation for the five hour practical database exam!

Year 13 students have nearly finalised now their exam unit which consists of 6 topics; Digital Devices, Transmitting Data, Operating Online, Protecting Data, Impact of IT Systems, Issues. Students are spending time on revising now for the exam in January and we wish them all success!


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Art and House Competition





We are very excited to be working collaboratively with CGT to help and support our students develop and improve a variety of transferable skills such as; communication, problem solving and teamwork to name but a few.



UCAS Applications

The UCAS university application cycle for this year has begun and is progressing very well. Those Year 13 students who have decided to apply to university are busy working on their personal statements and applications. It can be a stressful



time for students who are writing personal statements, we offer a great deal of support to them in order to make sure their personal statements are of high quality and captivating for university admissions tutors to read.

If your son/daughter is planning on applying to university, please help to encourage them to complete the personal statement and UCAS application as soon as possible. **The official UCAS deadline is 15 January 2021.**

Students have been applying for a variety of degree courses including Business, Paramedic Science, Psychology, Law and Midwifery to name a few. So far, 6 students have received all of the university offers.

Year 11 Careers Guidance Meetings

As part of the careers programme across the Trust, a large number of our students benefit from one-to-one guidance meetings with an external Careers Advisor. With Year 11 students starting to make Post 16 choices, it is important that they utilise these meetings to discuss their thoughts about future pathways. There are so many options available to students at all ability levels which can be overwhelming to some.

This year, thanks to modern technology, we are still able to offer this important service to our young people, virtually! In preparation for the meeting, students are asked to complete a questionnaire to get them thinking about possible career destinations. This information is shared with the Careers Advisor who will have a basis to start her conversation.



The Careers Department are also seeing students on an individual basis. These meetings are proving highly beneficial to all those we are seeing. Confidence, focus, aspirations and motivation are so important, and we work specifically with the individual to tailor the advice. It is amazing to see students leave with direction and laid out step-by-step goals for them over the coming years.



Those students interested in Colleges for their next steps will be having Teams meetings with local Colleges to support their applications and also answer any questions they have. Those applying for Sixth Forms are being provided with links to the relevant websites, to look at subjects and entry requirements. We are all hopeful that they may still be able to visit their establishment of choice at some point in the New Year, but we are working hard to continue in establishing virtual relationships to ease anxiety and nerves.

Given the current situation with Covid-19, many of the careers events available to our students have been put on hold, however, it is crucial for our older students to be able to access information and support to help them make decisions about their future education. There have been several virtual careers talks which students have been able to access.



Future Nurse Webinar

The Future Nurse talk was available to students in Years 11, 12 and 13. The aim of the talk was to give students who are interested in going into a nursing career, information about access routes, course and entry requirements. There were also two cases studies; 'A day in the life of a student nurse' and 'A day in the life of a registered nurse in practice'.



Several students took advantage of this fantastic opportunity to find out about the best routes for them into their chosen career.

Darcy Birch, a Year 11 student had this to say about the event:

"Throughout Year 10 I had no idea of what I wanted to do when I left school, then lockdown happened and this turned my school life upside down.

Coming back in September was daunting and before I knew it there was talk of Sixth form, College, and Apprenticeships and it was time to start really thinking about what I wanted to do after Year 11.

Every week our careers adviser, Mrs Barber, would post on show my homework "Job of the week".

I started to look at the jobs and was intrigued by becoming a Children's Nurse. I had also experienced a few operations and my time in hospital was always made easier by the care and attention I received by the nurses that took care of me.

I signed up for the NHS Future Nurse event and took part in the online discussions with both students and qualified professionals. I was able to ask questions and gain a further insight into the role of becoming a children's nurse. Hearing real life stories and experiences helped me to realise that this career was one that I was interested in. I have also signed up for another virtual NHS event in early December and I have applied for Bourne Academy Sixth form".



Apprenticeships and careers with the Armed Forces webinar

Amazing Apprenticeships hosted an exclusive webinar with the Armed Forces to explore the apprenticeship opportunities available within the British Army, Royal Navy and Royal Air Force. This webinar was available to students in Years 11, 12 and 13.


Sam Henderson, a Year 10 student had this to say about the event:

"I enrolled to attend the Armed Forces Apprenticeships webinar, organised through the school careers department. This was a 1-hour Zoom webinar with around 1000 attendees from across the country.

It was hosted by senior officers from the three services – the Army, Navy and Royal Air Force. It gave insight into apprenticeships and the different trades on offer. It also gave information about career progression, different roles on offer and the benefits that come with a military career.

Whilst I'm interested in a career with the Royal Marines, it still gave valuable insight into other options which I'd not previously considered such as more specialist roles. I was able to post questions beforehand to the hosts which were answered during the webinar".

Aspiring Medics Embrace Inspiring Programme





Medic Mentor is run by a UK-wide network of volunteer doctors who provide UCAS support and teach students how to become successful future doctors, vets, dentists and NHS leaders. There are many opportunities to take part in various activities, such as virtual work experience and virtual medical society meetings.

It is a truly inspiring organisation. But don't take our word for it - two of our aspiring students, give us an overview of their experience with the programme so far...

"My experience so far has been an amazing one. I have had the opportunity to get an insight into a real clinical setting where doctors deal with lots of different medical scenarios. I have really enjoyed taking part in the simulations. They have allowed me to observe what happens in a medical situation and how the whole healthcare team work together. My favourite part about the simulations is how realistic they are, making it feel as though I am observing a real life medical situation. I have had lots of opportunities to ask questions to leading doctors, junior doctors, nurses and even surgeons, helping me to gain lots of knowledge of their journeys and advice into medicine.

The Medic Mentor family has offered me lots of support through the reflective journal. The journal contains multiple homework tasks and a reflective cycle to follow to ensure I am making the most of my experience and reflecting on the skills used by the doctors and nurses.

Overall, the experience has been amazing. Being able to observe doctor's dealing with challenging situations has opened up my mind to the qualities of a healthcare profession and what the job entails."

"The Medic Mentor community is teamed with the University hospital of Birmingham; they were very welcoming and it was extremely easy to sign up to. I am an aspiring Biochemist and took advantage of the virtual work experience. Once a month, on a Saturday, I spend six to seven hours shadowing professionals, giving me a true insight of the myriad of jobs involved in being a doctor. The work experience also shows realistic procedures and the diagnostic time frames of a patient in an A&E setting. It is a 6 month programme offering a certificate at the end which will help you to apply for universities, especially any in the medic mentor group.

I have also joined a group of aspiring doctors and nurses across the country on this journey, with all different takes on medicine and different levels of knowledge. I am part of the virtual medical society where, on a Tuesday, we talk a little about subjects that are important in today's climate i.e. the new organ donor system; and discuss things that doctors need to know before going into the profession.

The Medic Mentor community also have groups for aspiring dentists and vets. So if you are aspiring to be a medic, I would honestly advise you to join the Medic Mentor community and learn a little about the subject you're interested in."



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School Information

First Aid Room at Bourne Academy

Did you know here at Bourne Academy we have a fully staffed First Aid room run by our qualified First Aiders Mrs Inglis and Mrs Buckley. What do they do?



Illnesses and Accidents

- * If a student becomes ill, they should go to the First Aid Room to be assessed and our first aiders will contact parents if necessary.
- * Some students may find themselves injured and may need a Movement Plan. The requirement for this should be discussed between the First Aiders, the parents and the student on the first day that the student is in school with the injury.

Medication

- * During the day some students require medication, and we ask that this is sent in, in the box you are given it in and with their prescription attached. A Medication Consent form will need to be signed by a parent or carer giving us permission to administer the medication. Students should not normally be carrying medication around in school.
- * We also deal with Health Care Plans for any students with specific needs e.g. diabetics. If you feel your Child has a complex medical need please contact the school to discuss if a plan is needed.

School Nurse Visits

During the school year, we also have the School Nurses visit.

- * In Year 8 the female students will be invited to have their HPV injections.
- * In Year 9, all students will be invited to have their Tetanus and Meningitis injections. These are now done through the school and students will not be able to routinely receive them through their doctors surgeries.

Attendance

The Trust's attendance policy allows us to streamline the work that we do and helps us in supporting those that need further assistance.

How to Report

Student absence should be reported on each morning of any absence by 8.30am. There are a number of ways of doing this:

- Texting in 07860 095 499 (please be aware that, as with all mobiles, if the mobile system is down we may not receive these and you may receive an absence message)

- Letters re appointments (please send in copies of hospital/dental/ orthodontic/doctor appointments for pre authorisation) Please bear in mind that as per the Academy's Attendance Policy, no appointments are authorised without medical evidence

Please note:

- ◆ Any absences not notified to the Academy that school day will be coded 'O – unauthorised absence' and will not be amended retrospectively.
- In support of student attendance, the school operates a monitor period after any absence of 4.5 days or more. Parents/carers will be notified of the start of this period by letter. Any further absence during this time could result in a Governor Panel meeting.
- Parents/carers will no longer be written to asking for reasons for previous absences.
