



Executive Head Teacher's Message

Dear Parent/Carer,

It is going to be quite a challenge to fit in all that needs to be said after such a busy and successful term 6, but I hope that I manage to cover as much as possible.





in these year groups, I have many fond memories of their time at the school and I really hope they do too. However, we hosted two fantastic proms to celebrate and mark the end of this stage of their educational careers and I certainly wish all our leavers all the best for the future and every success in their future careers.

Many of our Year 11 students will be returning to the school in September to undertake an A Level or BTEC and there was a highly successful Post 16 induction day this term, which also introduced many new young people to Bourne Academy from other local schools, who will be welcomed in September too.

The all important results days are on Thursday 15 August for Year 12 and 13 and Thursday 22 August for Year 11 and for Post 16 enrolment, with doors opening at 07.30am. I will be publishing the results in the local press, on the school website and I will be writing to parents to share the key highlights.

Other successful transition events this term include the appointment of our four new Year 13 Head Students, all of whom are inspirational young people - Tom Paskin; Richard Kilby; Annabel Reynard; Gaby Ndlovu and the Year 10 prefects, with just over 120 students being awarded their prefect ties and attending a Prefect Celebration Breakfast. In addition, the Year 6 transition taster day, where all the staff, amazing current Year 7 Buddies and Mrs Revell - Year 7 Lead, welcomed our new cohort of Year 7 students. It was good to see so many students choosing Bourne Academy and I can confirm that our school is again oversubscribed, with 250 new Year 7's joining us in September.

As well as academic success you will see in this newsletter many other achievements that celebrate the number of talented students we have at Bourne Academy. This term saw our first Battle of the Bands, which was a very 'cool' event, showcasing a range of musical genres with the Year 12 band, Lord of the Good Sea Otters being the overall winners. You will be able to check this band out when they headline the Bourne Christmas Lights Switch On in December. Music at Bourne Academy goes from strength to strength with many group and individual successes, with notable talent recognised on page 10 including Iqra Malik's recording of her new single 'You Get What You Pay For', which I have already downloaded!

Also this term a high level of artist talent was displayed and observed by the public in the Bourne Town Hall Art Exhibition, celebrating the achievements of many of our students. A particular favourite piece for me, which can be seen in this newsletter, was the extremely well executed and skilfully cut screen print by Archie Hay, entitled 'Small Voice, Big Ideas'. Also at the Town Hall the talents of our performing arts students were demonstrated in the Broadway in Bourne musical event, where many of the audience commented that it was one of the best school events ever seen and which raised a significant amount of money to support the restoration of this building. For the students to be able to have art work and performance work showcased in such a prominent position at the Town Hall in Bourne has been a privilege and we are extremely thankful for this opportunity and hope to continue with this positive community link in the future. The way the students of all ages came together as a close community for these arts events is certainly inspirational.

All of the staff at Bourne Academy encourage our young people to aim as high as possible, we run many initiatives to raise aspiration such as the Year 12 work experience and on page 21 you can read about some of their experiences.

The sporting achievements of our students can be seen featured throughout this newsletter and there are so many successes that it is hard to identify just one or two as the key highlights! Each band performed a short set which included songs that the act had chosen, at the end of their set they were given constructive feedback by four judges who had marked them on their song choice, musical ability and the bands overall stage presence.

Each band played their hearts out and blew the audience away with their professionalism and talent. A few highlights included the year 8 duo Ollie and Cam, who sang a stripped back version of Ed Sheeran's Shape of You. A year 9 band, Sunlit Skies, also smashed out She's So Lovely by Scouting For Girls, which the crowd enjoyed.

The judges came to a decision that year 9 duo Caitlin and Chloe deserved to be awarded 3rd place for their positive performance on stage. Another year 9 band, Next Gen, claimed 2nd place with judges commenting on excellent harmonies throughout their set. The overall winners for the first Battle of the Bands were the year 12 band, Lord of the Good Sea Otters. It was clear for everyone to see that this band had worked exceptionally hard to create a clean and perfectly executed set! We look forward to seeing them performing in town for the Christmas Lights Switch On in December!

Art Exhibition—Old Bourne Town Hall

In July the Art department exhibited students work in our first solo exhibition at the Old Town Hall in Bourne. Our students have spent all year working really hard to develop their skills and ideas and this event gave us the perfect opportunity to celebrate their achievements with friends, families and the community. Earlier this year we were awarded Artsmark Platinum by the Arts Council England, partly due to our community involvement, so this event was also an opportunity to celebrate this.

We exhibited work by students from all key stages to showcase the diversity of work and the progression in their skills. The varied curriculum we teach at Bourne Academy allows students to find a way in which to best communicate their ideas and so visitors were able to see examples of painting, drawing, digital, textiles and three dimensional design.

Mrs Conley commented "We were extremely pleased to host this prestigious event in Bourne and are very proud of the talent shown by our students in all of the arts subjects, being music, art and drama. The arts will always remain a very important part of our school curriculum and many of our students progress successfully in to arts related careers areas."



Memory Corina Avram Aged 16

This piece of work was developed in response to childhood memories and recurring nightmares. Looking at the work of Surrealist artists including Salvador Dali and Dorothy Tanning, Corina refined a realistic style of oil painting on a large scale. Montaging images from past and present Corina explored human psychology and memory.

Small Voice, Big Ideas Archie Hay, aged 16

The GCSE exam this year asked students to make a personal response to the word "Reflection". Students reacted in arrange of ways. This piece by Archie was a thoughtful investigation into youth culture and how they are reflected in the media. Archie produced a series of powerful screen prints which reflected the potential held by the individual and the importance to 'dream big'.



Fungi, Elara Kirtland aged 16

Elara has recently completed her GCSE Art Textiles qualification in which students learnt a range of skills including printing, weaving, construction and felting. In response to her *Natural Forms* assignment, Elara embarked on an in depth investigation into combining materials in order to create these woodland forms. As it illuminates with twinkling lights, she has managed to create a magical sculpture which will, no doubt create a stunning centre piece for the exhibition.

Vanity, by Gina Griffin aged 17

Responding to the title *Expedition*, Gina took humans' greatest expedition as her inspiration. Looking at and analysing the work of Dutch still life painters she looked at the way artists in history have depicted mortality and the fine line between life and death. Taking the skull as a symbol of the inevitability of death she juxtaposed beautiful colourful flowers as a reminder to celebrate the beauty of life. Combining materials she paints the skull with realism and utilises the bright vibrancy of inks to create a high contrast between the two.



Out and about with the Geography Department!

It's been a busy final term for the Geography department, with important fieldtrips for year 9 and 10, as well as a field week away for our A Level Geographers.

13 & 14 June - Year 10 coastal fieldwork in Hunstanton

On what were possibly the two worst June days for weather, year 10 GCSE students travelled to Hunstanton to collect data for their physical Geography enquiry. The weather forecast predicted high winds and heavy rain, and that's exactly what it gave us!





Despite the terrible conditions however, students worked extremely hard collecting data which they will use in their final exam in year 11. They carried out measurements of sediment size, beach gradient and height of sediment built up against groynes, all

to determine whether or not there are significant differences between Old and New Hunstanton.

Their hard work was rewarded with a warming fish and chip lunch in one of the few cafes open that day, which was appreciated by staff as well as students! Well done year 10 for your perseverance

through difficult weather conditions – you were fantastic!



27 & 28 June - Year 9 rivers fieldwork at the West Glen River

As an introduction to GCSE fieldwork and to support their rivers topic work in class, students undertook a field work investigation at the West Glen River. Here, they looked at two sections of the river's course – one in Swinstead, and the other further downstream in Carlby.



Thankfully the weather was much kinder to us over the two days, with suncream rather than rain coats required! Students were investigating how the river's characteristics changed as it moved downstream. They collected data on

the river's width and depth, channel gradient, sediment size and velocity.



Some pupils were very eager to get their wellies on and wade into the river, whilst others preferred to support from the banks! Once again, students represented Bourne Academy very well and completed work to a high standard, ready to present and analyse back in the classroom.



8-12 July – Year 12 A Level field week in the North York Moors

At the time of writing, A Level Geographers are preparing for their 5 day field trip to North Yorkshire and the Holderness coastline. They'll be using the week to collect data for their individual coursework investigations which contribute to 20% of their overall grade. This year, there are a variety of interesting enquiries including coastal defences and landforms, urban studies in Whitby & Goathland, river & scree investigations, sand dune studies and impacts of deforestation. The organisers were very impressed with the talent of the students even saying that some were deserving of their own festival slot.




Visiting Artist— Lydia Jackson



Year 12 Work Placements

Everyone in Year 12 is expected to take part in some form of work placement, which is the chance to explore potential career options or to build the skill set needed for future goals. Work placement took place 1-5 July, proving to be a really positive experience. Some students have written their accounts of how they got on:

I thoroughly enjoyed going back to my secondary school, Casterton College Rutland, to do a week's work experience. I observed lessons, co-planned with the teachers and was able to teach my own lesson to a range of year groups, ranging from Years 7 to 10. I worked in many departments, such as English, Geography and Drama. As I aspire to be an English teacher in the future, it was very beneficial to learn the skills needed and to get a feel of what it will be like to work in a classroom. I observed a poem being taught to the Year 7's, 'A hunchback in the park' and they then fed back to me the story behind it. Their task was then to write a dramatic monologue. We planned together some ideas that they could use, including what it would be like to be a homeless person and the feelings that you would experience. The class then wrote their dramatic monologue for 20 minutes and I listened to a few at the end. Having the responsibility to plan this lesson and stand in front of the students was a great experience and has definitely made my mind up that it is for sure the career that I want to have in the future. Furthermore, work experience was a positive thing to do as it helped me get a taste of what life will be like when I leave school and if what I did my work experience in is something I could see myself doing in the future. For my work experience I took part in cooperating with a team that works for the company Bridgestone Tyres. Throughout this week I learnt how to get on with a project without the need of reassurance or guidance to complete it, I also learnt how to manage multiple tasks through the week while getting on with the project that was set for me. Through completing this experience, I have learned a new software used to creating buildings and designs with precise measurements from scratch. For my work experience placement, I decided that it would be a great opportunity to volunteer for Revitalise at the Jubilee Lodge in Essex. During the week I stayed over at the centre in my own accommodation with one goal, to ensure that the guests enjoy their holiday over at the centre. At the start of the week I was assigned with taking the orders of volunteers and guests in the morning for breakfast, making sure to get their order correct the first time around. After breakfast the volunteers set out the tables for the next meal such as lunch or dinner, if you were not assigned a trip this would most likely be the most physically straining activity for the day. Every day a couple of guests go on trips to different locations such as Southbank, South End or even sailing with the volunteers. I had the experience to go to Southbank which resulted in a great day out and a nasty sunburn. 


